1. Background

- 1.1 The premises are a mobile burger bar which must be positioned between numbers 58 and 72 Market Street Ashby De La Zouch and currently hold a premises licence issued under the Licensing Act 2003. A copy of the premises licence is attached as **appendix 1**.
- 1.2 A map showing the location of the premises is attached as **appendix 2.**
- 1.3 An application for the variation of premises licence was received from Mr Shrain Tumber on 18 March 2015. A copy of the application is attached as **appendix 3**.
- 1.4 The variation of premises licence is detailed as follows.

Provision of late night refreshment

- Current permitted licensable activity is Fridays and Saturdays 23:00 to 02:30hrs the following morning. The application is to extend the terminal hour on Fridays and Saturdays to 03:30.
- To remove condition 5 of Annex 2 No drinks shall be sold or supplied except in plastic bottles.
- 1.5 The applicant has specified steps they intend to take in order to promote the four licensing objectives:

General – All four licensing objectives:

• The applicant will monitor each of the licensing objectives and make improvements should it be necessary.

The prevention of crime and disorder:

• The premises shall close immediately should there be any signs of crime until such time that it is safe to reopen.

Public safety:

- A first aid box shall be kept on site.
- Food Temperatures shall be logged.

The prevention of public nuisance:

- A silent running generator shall be used to minimise sound and toxic fumes.
- Outside of the premises shall be swept clean to ensure that the street is kept as clean as possible.

The protection of children from harm:

 The premises shall operate no identification no sale policy whereby no children under the age of 16 shall be served after 2100hours unless they are accompanied by an adult.

2.0 Representations

- 2.1 In respect of an application to vary the premises licence, the applicant is responsible for advertising the application by way of a notice in specified form at the premises for not less than 28 consecutive days and in a local newspaper. The applicant placed a notice in the Coalville and Ashby Times on 20 March 2015 and Officers are satisfied that the correct notices have been displayed at the premises. Details of the application were also posted onto the Council website on 19 March 2015.
- 2.2 No representations have been received from any of the responsible authorities.
- 2.3 Any other person is able to make representations within 28 days of display of the notice of application to the Licensing Authority.
- 2.4 Two representations have been received on the prevention of crime and disorder, public nuisance and public safety. Copies of the representations are attached as **appendices 4** and 5.
- 2.5 The applicant has submitted additional information to support their application. This information is attached as **appendix 6.**

3.0 Cumulative Impact

- 3.1 The premises are situated in Market Street, Ashby De La Zouch which is within the area of the special policy on cumulative impact referred to in the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 3.2 The effect of adopting a special policy of this kind is to create a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences or club premises certificates or variations will

normally be refused, following relevant representations, unless the applicant can demonstrate in their operating schedule that there will be no negative cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives.

3.3 The Licensing Authority recognises that this policy cannot be absolute and will consider each application properly on its merit and those that are unlikely to contribute to the cumulative impact problems will be approved.

4.0 Statutory Guidance

4.1 In making its decision, the Sub-Committee is obliged to have regard to Guidance issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. All Licensing Committee members have been provided with a full copy of the guidance document. Officers consider that paragraphs 1.1 to 1.17, 2.1 to 2.5, 2.6 to 2.8, 2.14 to 2.18, 3.11 to 3.18, 8.42, 8.66 to 8.69, 8.72 to 8.80, 9.1 to 9.10, 9.30 to 9.39, 9.41 to 9.43, 10.1 to 10.10, 12.1, 12.10, 13.1 and 13.20 to 13.23, may have a bearing upon the application.

5.0 Statement of Licensing Policy

5.1 The Sub-Committee is also obliged to have regard to its own Statement of Licensing Policy. Officers consider that paragraphs 2.1 to 2.5, 3.0, 4.1 to 5.1 to 5.4, 6.1 to 6.4, 10.0, 11.0, 20.0, 22.0, 23.0, and 26.0 may have a bearing upon the application.

6.0 Observations

- 6.1 The Committee is obliged to determine this application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives, which are:
 - the prevention of crime and disorder;
 - public safety:
 - the prevention of public nuisance;
 - the protection of children from harm.
- 6.2 The Committee may take such of the following steps, if any, as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - a) Grant the application as requested.
 - b) Modify the conditions of the licence, by altering or omitting or adding to them.
 - c) Reject the whole or part of the application.
- 6.3 There is a right of appeal to the Magistrates Court against the decision of the Sub-Committee by the applicant and persons who made relevant representations.


Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

- 1. The licensee shall ensure that customers are served as quickly as possible.
- 2. The licensee and person in charge of the premises shall co-operate with any instructions given by the Leicestershire Constabulary.
- 3. Gas bottles shall be appropriately stored in a sufficiently ventilated area not accessible by members of the public.
- 4. No customers shall be permitted access to the mobile unit.
- 5. No drinks shall be sold or supplied except in plastic bottles or cups.
- 6. All rubbish shall be swept away at the end of opening hours when the Premises have been trading.
- 7. No children under the age of 16 shall be served after 2100hours unless they are accompanied by an adult.
- 8. The premises must not remain on the location outside the licensed trading hours.
- 9. The premises must remain within the location whilst trading and must not position itself in any other location.
- 10. The licence holder is under an obligation to ensure that all reasonable steps are taken so as to ensure the reduction in nuisance/disturbance to neighbours, residents and occupiers of adjoining premises.
- 11. The fuel source for the generator will be stored in an appropriate manner compliant with fire safety requirements.
- 12. The licence holder shall comply with the Street Trading consent and conditions at all times.
- 13. Where the premises are unavailable for use by the licence holder, due to repairs/maintenance, a replacement premises will be permitted for use under this licence for a period not exceeding four weeks provided permission is first sought from the licensing authority (such permission to not be unreasonably withheld)

We object to this application for extension of trading hours of this license.

Police statistics show that extending licensing hours encourages crimes and disorder violence and criminal damage by encouraging drunken customers to linger in the street rather than go home. Reported late night crime of antisocial behaviour, violence and criminal damage has increased from 452 incidents in 2013 to 468 incidents in 2014 with extended opening hours granted to licensed premises. Also that the majority of crime is committed at closing time or later. The proposed license to run for an extra hour is therefore contrary to licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder and reinforcing public safety

It will also create a public nuisance with late night noise for local residents who live above retail premises in market street and residents in union passage and south street. It is unreasonable to subject these residents to an extra hour of disturbance. This is contrary to the public nuisance objective.

Market street is covered by the saturation policy which give presumption to refusal of adverse change to current licenses.

We would therefore ask that this application is refused.

2013 survey of the late night time economy

Executive summary

In November 2012 the Licensing Committee of Ashby de la Zouch Town Council resolved that a survey of the views of people who live and work in the centre of Ashby on the late night economy in the town should be conducted. Over 400 forms were distributed to homes and businesses in the town centre and 49 forms returned.

Key themes coming from the survey

- Changing the closing time for night clubs from 3am to 2:30am is seen by 68% of respondents as having an impact with 39% seeing this impact as beneficial.
- The opening hours of the fast food establishments are seen by 66% of respondents to have an impact, with 55% seeing this impact as detrimental.
- The opening hours of pubs are seen by 72% of respondents as having an impact, with 55% seeing this impact as detrimental.
- Litter and dirty streets are seen as issues by 27 of the 49 respondents when related to the opening hours of fast food establishments.
- Problems with noise and disruption are seen as issues relating to club closing times by 22 respondents.
- The night clubs were viewed as controlling drunken people better than the pubs, as they could refuse admission.
- The economic value of the night time economy is acknowledged, alongside
 maintaining competitiveness with neighbouring towns and earlier closing
 could hamper this. Others wanted to improve the market mix in the town, with
 a wider range of customers being attracted to pubs and restaurants.
- 5 respondents acknowledged improvements in recent years with the no drinking in the street, the Street Pastors and CCTV being beneficial.

Closing times were seen as an issue with 36 respondents suggesting different closing times, ranging from 11pm to 2am, but 7 respondents wanted a later closing time to help maintain competitiveness with neighbouring towns and to spread out the times people leave. One common theme was wanting fast food establishments to close at the same time as, or even earlier than the night clubs.

Recommendation

It is recommended that this report is received and noted by the Committee.

2013 survey of the late night time economy

1. Introduction

In May 2012 Ashby de la Zouch Town Council decided to establish a standalone Licensing Committee to consider licensing applications. During 2012 there were a number of applications from night clubs and fast food establishments in the town seeking to extend their licensing hours. The town council made representations opposing these applications, but felt that it would be useful to carry out a survey of people living and working in the town centre on the late night economy. The results of the survey would give the new Licensing Committee additional evidence on the views of the people of Ashby which could be used to inform representations on licensing matters.

On 12 November 2012 the Licensing Committee agreed that a survey would be sent out to residents and businesses based in the immediate vicinity of Market Street, Bath Street, South Street and Bath Street. In March 2013 the survey was sent out to to 402 residential properties and businesses within the town centre. Streets covered included:

- Lower Church Street, South Street and Prior Park Road
- Upper Church Street and Wood Street (upto Upper Church Street junction)
- Market Street, Huntingdon Court, Mill Lane Mews, Rushton's Yard, Union Passage, Pass Courtyard and Bakery Court
- North Street, Claridge Place and Hood Court
- Brook Street, Elford Street, The Green and Mill Bank
- Bath Street, Rawdon Terrace and Kilwardby Street (town centre end)
- Derby Road and bottom of Burton Road





The changes were seen as beneficial by 11 people for the following reasons:













4. Views on the impact of the opening hours of pubs on the town centre.



There were 60 separate comments (some respondents made more than one comment) on what people would change about the late night economy.

The current hours elicited the most comments (36) with a range of hours being suggested:

- 7 people wanted later opening hours with specific reasons given in two comments, one to maintain competitiveness with other towns and the other to spread out the time people leave.
- Five respondents felt that closing times should not go beyond the current 2:30am (one of whom included all establishments in that comment).
- The remaining comments gave a range of closing times for different establishments ranging from 11pm to 2am. With 5 respondents specifically commenting on the opening hours of fast food establishments and wanting them to close at the same time as the clubs or earlier.

There were 9 comments about the environment especially littering (7) with suggestions that the fast food outlets pay for clearing the litter or are fined (3). Respondents also felt their should be better toilet facilities and noise control.

The market mix in the town was commented on by 5 respondents with most wanting establishments to attract a wider range of customers, for example emphasising Ashby as a cultural market town which is safe and respectable for all age groups. There was one respondent who felt there should be more pubs and clubs in the town.



Also I would like to point out that 2.30 is when the clubs close and people leave the clubs, not having any food available for when they leave cause more harm than good, hence the reason I decided to stay open and serve cold food. They are eating the cold food, but a majority of people are asking for it to be hot, and I have to tell them that I can't serve hot food due to licencing and can only serve cold food after 2.30am. Whilst I'm serving cold food the que starts to die down at around 3am. The customers would be a lot happy having hot food rather than cold. It's something I will carry on doing serving cold food if need to be as customers need food when the my leave the clubs.

I have spoken to mark Watson prior to making the application, and his only concern was parking outside the club, as it's a magnet, I did say I try my best not to park outside the club exit, as sometimes I'm waiting 2-4 hours for a space. I would also like to stress if there was any concerns from the police, they would of made an objection to my application. If we can come to some sort of arrangement before the hearing or discuss anything further, then please do not hesitate to contact me.
